Executive Summary

The first half of 2024 has been a period of significant progress and impactful initiatives for ROYM Nepal. Established in 2009, ROYM Nepal continues to strive towards reducing poverty through skill transformation and youth engagement, aligning with our mission to achieve long-term sustainable development goals in Nepal.

Key Highlights and Achievements:

- 1. Skill Development Programs:** We successfully conducted multiple skill development workshops, including the Mobile Repair Training Program in Mahottari, which empowered over 25 youths with technical skills, enhancing their employability.
- 2. Community Resilience Projects:** Our Saksham Saptari project focused on building community resilience through climate change adaptation and mitigation measures, benefiting over 1000 households in the Saptari District.
- 3. Women Empowerment Initiatives:** The Jibika project continued to support socio-economic empowerment of women, Dalits, and ethnic groups in Dhading District, with over 1000 women receiving training in various income-generating activities.
- 4. Human Rights Advocacy:** Through the EKATA campaign, we promoted solidarity and the rights of young human rights defenders, organizing workshops and awareness programs that reached over 1,000 participants.

Financial Performance: Despite the challenging economic environment, ROYM Nepal maintain a stable financial position. Our total revenue for the period is NPR 80 million, with significant contributions from international donors and local fundraising efforts. Expenditures are carefully managed, with 70% allocated to program activities, 20% to administrative costs, and 10% to fundraising and outreach.

Future Outlook: Looking ahead, ROYM Nepal is committed to expanding our impact through innovative projects and strategic partnerships. We plan to launch new initiatives focused on sustainable agriculture, renewable energy, and digital literacy, aiming to reach even more communities across Nepal.

Our vision is to create a socio-economically empowered society with equality and social justice. We believe in the transformative power of collective action and the inherent value of every voice. Our approach includes community development, integrated commercial farming, microfinance services, research, training, and promoting dialogue and learning.

During this period, we have undertaken various projects and initiatives aimed at improving the lives of the communities we serve. Vision: Our vision is to create a socio-economically empowered society where every individual enjoys equal rights and social justice. We envision a Nepal where marginalized groups thrive, their voices are heard, and structural discrimination is challenged.

PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

ROYM Nepal Conducts Climate Change Workshops, January 31, 2024, Saptari



In a significant community outreach, ROYM Nepal held a series of workshops in January 2024 to introduce the SAKSHAM Saptari Project to local communities in Saptari. The workshops aimed to educate residents on climate change and discuss the project's objectives and implementation strategies.

The sessions, led by ROYM staff, were instrumental in building rapport with community members and providing them with a comprehensive understanding of climate change and its local impact. The discussions revealed a general lack of awareness about climate change among the participants, highlighting the need for such educational initiatives. The workshops were attended by 293 participants, with a strong female majority, indicating a positive step towards inclusive community engagement. The orientation proved to be an eye-opener for many, as it underscored the necessity for behavioral change to address climate challenges.

Riverbank Protection through Nature-Based Solutions, February 9, 2024, Saptari



In early 2024, ROYM Nepal embarked on an ambitious initiative within the SAKSHAM Saptari Project to establish nature-based solutions for riverbank protection. Recognizing the cost-effective and sustainable benefits of such measures, the project focused on addressing riverbank erosion, flooding, and inundation issues.

The planning and preparatory phase began with a collaborative approach, involving coordination with the Palika's Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) section and local ward representatives. On February 9, 2024, a joint feasibility study was conducted, bringing together key stakeholders, including DRR Chief Mr. Rajesh Jha, Chairperson Mr. Munilal Mukhiya, and community members.

During the field visit, Mr. Jha recommended starting the activity upstream and emphasized the necessity of a three-layered plantation approach, or at least two layers,

to effectively control soil erosion. The Divisional Forest Office pledged support for the initiative, promising to provide saplings and technical assistance for the plantation efforts.

The World Social Forum 2024: A Convergence for Change February 9, 2024, Kathmandu



The World Social Forum (WSF), a beacon for global solidarity, once again united activists, organizations, and individuals from across the globe in Kathmandu. This annual congregation is a testament to the power of collective action and shared vision for addressing the world's most pressing social, economic, and environmental challenges. ROYM Nepal addressed these challenges through community interventions aimed at building resilience and providing disaster preparedness support.

Alternative Art Space: A Beacon of Expression at the World Social Forum 2024 February 14, 2024, Kathmandu



The World Social Forum 2024, a symposium of progressive thought and action, was elevated by the vibrant presence of the Alternative Art Space. This creative hub blossomed into a focal point for artistic expression, engaging the minds and hearts of schoolchildren and college students alike.

From February 8 to 14, Padmakanya Campus Bagbazar became a crucible of creativity. Participants from Freedom Studio, ROYM Nepal, Digo Bikas Institute, and Grassroot Development joined forces to curate a space that not only showcased art but also inspired societal change.

The event was a resounding success, with nearly 400 participants channeling their passion into 142 canvas artworks. These pieces, rich in color and diverse in medium, boldly addressed the 14 thematic areas of the World Social Forum. From environmental degradation to gender

violence, from the brain drain in Nepal to the quest for peace and social justice, each artwork served as a touching narrative of the challenges we face.

The artworks struck a chord with the 30,000 visitors, prompting deep reflection and dialogue.

Intercontinental Youth Forum: Advocates for a Sustainable Future February 19, 2024, Kathmandu



The 16th edition of the World Social Forum was marked by the Intercontinental Youth Forum, a gathering that transformed Kathmandu into a melting pot of youthful zeal and advocacy from February 17 to 19, 2024. Involvement of ROYM Nepal, in this forum was not just an event; it was a movement, a collective uprising against the status quo of inequality and neoliberalism that has long stifled dreams and erased histories.

The forum's ten sessions and numerous parallel events saw young advocates and activists from around the world unite to challenge and dismantle the structures of

inequality, exploitation, and militarization that plague our communities.

The youth stood firm against imperialistic, conservative, capitalist, and fundamentalist powers, advocating for the rights of women, Dalits, the poor, indigenous people, people of color, LGBTQI+ communities, people with disabilities, and all oppressed communities. They called for an intersectional feminist approach to policies and funding, recognizing the role of men and boys as allies in the fight for gender equality and justice.

The forum's participants urged governments to eliminate inequality, discrimination, and untouchability, and to ensure inclusive, qualitative, and accessible public education and healthcare for all. They advocated for significant investment in mental health services and the protection of digital rights, demanding equitable access to safe online spaces.

The youth insisted on the creation of decent, clean, and just jobs, rejecting exploitation and displacement, and envisioning an economy based on social justice. They resisted false climate solutions and demanded real, people-led initiatives to protect the planet and communities.

The forum called for the restructuring of global power dynamics to foster social justice, economic equality, and sustainable development. It emphasized the need for land, food sovereignty, and housing rights as fundamental human rights.

The youth called for peace, disarmament, and the elimination of nuclear weapons, standing in solidarity with Palestine and condemning the violence by Israel.

In unity, the participants pledged to turn their discussions into tangible actions, mobilizing communities to challenge oppressive systems and advance social justice. They declared their commitment to a world where dignity, equality, and solidarity reign supreme.

The World Youth Assembly on Climate Justice: A Movement for Sustainable Change February 22, 2024, Kathmandu



The World Youth Assembly on Climate Justice transcended the bounds of a mere event to become a movement that galvanized the collective energy, ideas, and passion of the global youth. The involvement of ROYM Nepal, this assembly served as a critical platform for fostering innovative ideas, providing support and guidance, and driving a united effort towards a sustainable and just future.

Youth from various corners of the world

convened to share perspectives and strategies to combat climate change and promote a climate justice environment. Young artists' talents, employed diverse forms of expression to communicate the urgent themes of climate justice. A hands-on initiative was taken, where participants took to the World Social Forum area to engage in a cleaning campaign, symbolizing their advocacy for environmental sustainability.

Janakpur Witnesses Vibrant International Women's Day Rally March 15, 2024, Janakpur



The city of Janakpur, the heart of Madhesh Province, was awash with color and fervor on March 7, as the Rural Oriented Youth Movement Nepal (ROYM-Nepal) and a coalition of global organizations came together to celebrate International Women's Day.

The event, a collaborative effort featuring partnerships with UNFPA, UNICEF, USAID, Save The Children, UNOPS, INSEC, Pac-Nepal, and World Vision, began its journey at Janka Chowk and made its way to the

Sports and Social Development Ministry of Madhesh Province.

The rally drew in a crowd of approximately one hundred participants, each one a voice for change.

Team ROYM-Nepal's commitment, marched with a mission to shine a light on the myriad challenges faced by women. Goal was to raise awareness, promote inclusivity, and highlight the continuous efforts needed to achieve gender equality.

Adorned with banners and chanting for empowerment, the marchers represented a diverse cross-section of society. Their unified call for gender equality, an end to violence against women, and equal opportunities for all resonated throughout the city, embodying solidarity and the hope for transformative change.

The day's events culminated with the presentation of an attention letter to the Prime Minister's office, symbolizing the collective plea for action and recognition. This letter, routed through the District Administration Office of Dhanusha, stands as a testament to the unwavering spirit of the rally and its participants.

ROYM Nepal's JIBIKA Project Kickstarts in Dhading, March 19, 2024, Dhading



In March 2024, ROYM Nepal launched the JIBIKA project, marking a significant step towards socio-economic empowerment in Dhading district. The project's introduction and orientation program, held across Neelkantha Municipality and Netrawoti Dobjong Rural Municipality, witnessed the participation of local government officials, community leaders, and women's agencies. The events, spanning from March 18 to 19, facilitated vital discussions on development priorities and potential project activities. A total of 45 participants engaged in these sessions, which aimed to introduce ROYM Nepal's mission and the JIBIKA project's objectives.

Key outcomes included the identification of potential areas for group formation and project programming, as well as the establishment of connections with local leaders for ongoing coordination. The program also provided insights into traditional cultural practices and current community activities.

With the successful conclusion of the orientation program, ROYM Nepal assured participants that it is poised to empower the communities of Dhading with sustainable development and inclusive growth.

Enhanced Livestock Management in Saptari with Comprehensive Training, March 19, 2024, Saptari



ROYM Nepal concluded a three-day Livestock Farming training from March 17 to 19, 2024, in the Terai belt of Saptari. The event aimed to address the challenges faced by local farmers in managing their livestock, particularly in the wake of seasonal diseases post-winter.

The training commenced with an introduction to animal husbandry, emphasizing its significance and the unique conditions of livestock farming in the Terai region. Participants were acquainted with various indigenous and exotic breeds of cattle, goats, and buffalo, learning about their distinct characteristics.

The second day focused on the importance of shed improvement and converting animal waste into compost manure. Discussions also covered the identification and management of common livestock diseases and parasites, equipping farmers with the knowledge to care for their animals effectively.

The final day introduced advanced topics such as castration, breeding procedures, and artificial insemination, highlighting their benefits and methodologies. Participants also received general medicines for common ailments, ensuring they are well-prepared to maintain the health of their livestock.

This training marks a significant step towards enhancing the productivity and sustainability of livestock farming in Saptari, empowering farmers with the skills needed for effective animal husbandry.

Kitchen Garden Training in Saptari, March 22, 2024, Saptari



In an effort to promote sustainable living and enhance food security, ROYM Nepal organized a series of Kitchen Garden trainings in Saptari from March 13 to 22, 2024. The one-day sessions, were adapted to the field conditions and successfully conducted for five different groups.

The training introduced 180 participants, predominantly women, to the principles of Bio-intensive farming systems. Emphasizing the importance of multi-cropping and the use of bio-pesticides, the farmers learned to cultivate their kitchen gardens in a more organized and productive manner.

To support the practical application of the training, ROYM Nepal provided mini kits containing five varieties of vegetable seeds to 150 farmers. The support package included Pumpkin, Beans, Lady's Finger/Okra, Amaranthus, and Chamsur Leafy Vegetable seeds. This initiative aimed to encourage diverse cropping practices and ensure a steady supply of fresh vegetables for their families.

Climate Smart Farmers Field School, March 30, 2024, Saptari



ROYM Nepal launched the Climate Smart Farmers Field School on March 30, 2024, marking a stride towards sustainable agriculture in the face of climate change.

This innovative program diverges from traditional schooling methods, focusing instead on practical demonstrations that lead to tangible results. It serves as an informal learning hub for elite farmers, equipping them with adaptive and innovative farming techniques to counteract the adverse effects of climate change.

A select group of master farmers, one from each settlement group, was convened to form the core of this learning community. They were meticulously briefed on the school's schedule, curriculum, and objectives. The inaugural gathering at the designated 2 katthas (0.067 ha) plot in Mukhiya Tole set the stage for a series of weekly sessions, where these farmers will continue to meet and learn through the harvest season.

Community Climate Change Orientation, March 31, 2024, Saptari



ROYM Nepal conducted community-level orientations on climate change and its impacts. These sessions were pivotal, as the success of climate initiatives largely depends on community perception and discussion of climate issues.

From project initiation to March 2024, 48 orientations were held, engaging 1010 participants from various households. Notably, the majority of participants were female, with 926 women attending alongside 84 men.

The orientations addressed the community's experiences with natural calamities, such as erratic rainfall and flooding, and their lack of knowledge on how to effectively respond to these challenges. The sessions emphasized the need for behavioral change and the adoption of new adaptive measures, encapsulated in the motto "Think Globally, Act Locally."

Addressing Drought with Innovative Solutions, March 31, 2024, Saptari



In a significant move towards sustainable agriculture, ROYM Nepal has successfully installed group-owned tube wells and pump sets in drought-prone regions of Saptari. The project, which took place from March 1, saw the installation of seven units across three strategic locations: Ram Tole, Mukhiya Tole, and Koiladi Tole.

The initiative began with the SAKSHAM Saptari team's development of a guideline to identify the most affected areas. Following this, focused group discussions led to the selection of locations that would ensure maximum land coverage and community benefit. The operation of the pump sets and tube wells was determined according to the guideline, culminating in the installation process.

This project has set a precedent for community-led solutions to environmental challenges, demonstrating ROYM Nepal's commitment to fostering resilience and self-sufficiency among local farmers.

Commercial Vegetable Farming Training, March 31, 2024, Saptari



For Saptari's agricultural community, ROYM Nepal conducted a three-day training on commercial vegetable farming from March 29 to March 31, 2024. The training aimed to empower local farmers with the technical knowledge necessary for maximizing their crop yields and navigating the market effectively.

The training addressed the critical need for technical expertise among farmers engaged in both seasonal and off-seasonal vegetable cultivation. With the region's proximity to major markets in Rajbiraj and Hanumannagar, and a smaller market near the India border, the demand for fresh vegetables presented a ripe opportunity for local farmers. The training sessions were designed to guide them in organized farming practices, introduce off-seasonal cultivation techniques, and provide solutions to common challenges such as selecting the right crop varieties and managing insect pests.

A notable aspect of the event was the participation of 25 local farmers, predominantly women, which reflected a shift in the traditional roles within the Terai community. This change signifies a broader acceptance and involvement of women in agricultural and business activities, challenging the stereotype that confines them to household chores.

Despite the region's susceptibility to early floods and inundation during the rainy

season, the training was a resounding success. The participants, equipped with new skills and knowledge, are expected to disseminate what they have learned within their groups and apply these practices to enhance their farming livelihoods.

Support for Riverbed Farming, March 31, 2024, Saptari



ROYM Nepal provided essential aid to farmers engaged in riverbed farming in Saptari from March 10 to 31, 2024. A total of 59 farmers received a diverse range of Cucurbits and Bean Seeds, including varieties such as Zucchini, Climbing Pumpkin, Lady's Finger, Bitter Gourd, Cucumber, Bottle Gourd, Sponge Gourd, and Beans. This strategic support is expected to yield significant benefits as the vegetables begin to fruit, offering farmers the opportunity to generate income through market sales.

Community Empowerment through JIBIKA Project April 2, 2024, Dhading



From March 26 to April 2, 2024, ROYM-Nepal's JIBIKA project embarked on a transformative journey in the Dhading district. The project's commitment to socio-economic empowerment was brought to life through the formation of 10 dynamic groups across Neelkantha Municipality and Netrawoti Dobjong Rural Municipality, uniting 208 dedicated members from diverse backgrounds.

The JIBIKA project was introduced, aiming to uplift women, Dalits, and ethnic groups through sustainable livelihood opportunities. Platforms were established for marginalized communities to voice their concerns and influence local decision-making. Knowledge and skills were shared to enhance agricultural practices and promote gender equality in farming.

The formation of these groups marked a new chapter in Dhading's journey towards inclusive development. With a focus on enhancing livelihoods and advocating for

equitable resource access, ROYM-Nepal nurtured a brighter future for all community members.

Orientation and Workshop in Rautahat, April 10, 2024, Rautahat



The orientation program of the project was held in 8th and 9th April, 2024 for two days. The representatives and staffs of ROYM Nepal from central office and project staffs of Rupantaran supported program team were participated in the orientation. The program was conducted informally with the objectives of sharing the project background and review of the activities carried out in previous months in details to staffs for the implementation of the project. The organizational details like history, goals, thematic areas and technical aspects were displayed and informed to the participants by Executive Director of ROYM Nepal. The background, objectives, program activities and budget were presented. The allocation of the staffs was done for management of the program, evaluation, reporting and entertainment. The field visit was also carried out in the project area with short interaction with community people and

local level stakeholders of ward and palikas. After orientation, workshop was conducted for two days. The workshop provided the participants with the knowledge and practical skills necessary to effectively lead the project. The workshop was highly engaging for the preparation of annual plan of the project. The project activities, implementation process and methods, duration, indicators, means of verification and responsibilities are discussed thoroughly. Rupantaran team with the support of Program Coordinator planned the project activities in the project area to use it as the basis of their organizing plan for finding stakeholders, members for forming groups and perform training activities and advocacy and aligning activities of project.

Successful Handover of Learning Center in Malangwa, April 18, 2024, Malangwa



On 18th April 2024, a significant milestone was achieved with the successful handover/takeover of the learning center in Malangwa ward no. 3. The event was graced by the presence of the ward president, Mr. Pramod Ray Yadav, ward secretary, Mr.

Chandeshwor Ray Yadav, staff of the ward office, and the ROYM Nepal Sarlahi team. The learning center is now well-equipped with essential learning materials and is home to 35 students (18 girls and 17 boys), all under the supervision and care of a dedicated Resource Person.

District Level Project Sharing Meeting, April 23, 2024, Dhading



On April 23, 2024, ROYM Nepal, in partnership with Ward No. 5 of Nilkantha Municipality, oriented the Jibika Project in Dhading. This event marked a significant milestone in community development, focusing on economic and social empowerment for marginalized communities, including women, Dalits, and indigenous groups. The program began with an introduction to ROYM Nepal and an overview of the Jibika Project's goals for fostering sustainable livelihoods. Key attendees included the Ward Chairman, the Deputy Mayor of Nilkantha Municipality, the Assistant Chief District Officer, and representatives from various governmental and non-governmental organizations.

The event aimed to provide detailed inform

ation about ROYM Nepal and the Jibika Project, outline thematic areas, discuss the project's budget, and strengthen coordination among stakeholders. It also sought to engage stakeholders in constructive discussions and develop partnerships for the project's success.

The launch event featured profound discussions and presentations on the project's framework and its anticipated community impact. Keynote speakers, including the Deputy Mayor, Ward Chairperson, Assistant Chief District Officer, and leaders from the Journalists' Association and NGO Federation, emphasized the importance of such initiatives. The event began with the national anthem, followed by speeches and a comprehensive overview of the Jibika Project by Harisharan Dhittal, the District Project Coordinator of ROYM Nepal. The discussions highlighted the project's commitment to economic and social empowerment through alternative income sources and skill development programs.

Rajaram Sharma, Chairperson of the Federation of Nepal Journalists-Dhading, stressed the importance of transparency and public engagement in documenting the project's progress. Salik Ram Duwadi, Chairperson of the NGO Federation, emphasized the need for cohesive efforts and strategic planning to achieve impactful work within the community.

The meeting successfully established a

collaborative platform for stakeholders to exchange feedback, innovative solutions, and best practices, fostering mutual learning and expediting the development process.

Community Orientation and Group Formation- Neelkantha municipality ward no 5 and Netrawati Dabjong Rural municipality ward no 5, April 28, 2024, Dhading



ROYM-Nepal has been started a new project on Dhading district with a title of JIBIKA (Socio-Economic Empowerment of Women, Dalit, and Ethnic Groups in Dhading District) an aim to address these issues by implementing activities to enhance livelihood opportunities and empower marginalized communities. By diversifying income sources through initiatives like cash crop cultivation, vegetable farming, and livestock rearing, residents can improve financial stability. Additionally, the project seeks to increase the active participation of women, Dalits, and marginalized groups in local decision-making bodies through leadership development and capacity-building programs. Previously after the ward level interaction and decision to formed group in particular tole of Neelkantha Municipality-5 and Netrawoti RM-5 including Wada President, local political parties representative and other social personals. we circulate our social mobilizer staff and agri-technician in both ward for group meeting. Overall, the formation of women farmers groups

contributes to the empowerment, capacity building, and social and economic advancement of women in agriculture, ultimately leading to more inclusive and sustainable rural development.

Celebration of International Labor Day, May 1, 2024, Rautahat



The International Labour Day has been celebrated on 1st May, 2024 with a theme of Advancing Social Justice, Promoting decent work. The program was successfully conducted in Brindaban-7 of Rautahat district under the chairmanship of Mayor of Brindaban Municipality. With the objectives of spreading awareness of the contribution that workers and the working class make to society the program was launched. In the program there was discussion on the theme, history and significance of International Labor Day. Altogether 197 people were participated in the event including 129 females and 68 males. There was interaction with laborers especially women group who are engaged in different wage labor activities. Similarly, a rally was done with pamphlets for advocating the workers' rights, fair wages, and improved working conditions through pamphlets.

International Labour Day Celebration, May 1, 2024, Dhading



On May 1, 2024, the International Labour Day event was celebrated with enthusiasm at Nilakantha Municipality Ward No. 5. The event aimed to honor the contributions of workers worldwide, raise awareness about labor rights, and advocate for fair and equitable working conditions. Key figures, including Ward President Mr. Ram Bdr. Shrestha, Ward Health Facilitator Miss Sunita Pandey, Sirjana Shrestha, and Lab Technician Mrs. Pabitra Gurung, facilitated the program with active participation from the Khalte farmer's group and youth group members. In the wake of the devastating fire that swept through Jaralhawa and Miya toles in ward 6 of Matihani Municipality, Mahottari, ROYM Nepal, in partnership with Aide à l'Enfance de l'Inde et du Népal (AEIN), has been at the forefront, providing timely and compassionate assistance to the affected families.

On May 3, ROYM staff, arrived with a convoy of relief materials directly to the epicenter of the disaster. Our team worked tirelessly to establish women-friendly and child-friendly spaces, ensuring a safe and nurturing environment for the most vulnerable.

Currently, two local residents have been recruited as staff members of ROYM Nepal for a three-month period: one as a volunteer and the other as a facilitator. Both are regularly working on-site to coordinate aid distribution and provide support services.

We've distributed nutritious food to lactating mothers, Sattu/Lito for children, provided water-proof tarpaulins for shelter, and supplied essential items like mats and emergency lights to bring comfort in the darkness.

We stand in solidarity with the people of Mahottari and remain committed to our humanitarian mission. Together, we will rebuild and emerge stronger.

Three-Month Dhaka weaving Training, May 14, 2024, Dhading



The 3-month Dhaka Weaving Training for Rural Women, conducted under the JIBIKA project, commenced on May 14, 2024, in Netrawoti Dobjung Rural Municipality Ward No. 5, Dhading. The training, held from 2081/02/01 to 2081/04/30, was coordinated with the rural municipality and ward office, in collaboration with Pavil Sana Kishan Krishi Sakari Sashta Ltd, and financially supported by AEIN Luxembourg. A total of nine participants were trained during this period.

The primary objectives of the program were to enhance women's financial independence and socio-economic status, provide training in Dhaka weaving techniques, empower women artisans, and promote gender equality by offering equal access to training and employment opportunities in the textile industry. The training was inaugurated in Katunje Bajar, with the official opening, by key figures including the Chairperson of the rural municipality, Mr. Megnath Rijal, Vice Chairperson Miss Sita Maya Tamang,

Chairperson of ROYM Miss Sarmila Sharma, and Ward Chairperson of Ward No. 5, Mr. Hari Adhakari. The training was guided by Miss Kumari Majhi and ran daily from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM.

Training sessions focused on various aspects of Dhaka weaving, including yarn preparation, loom setup, pattern weaving, and finishing. Experienced Dhaka weavers served as instructors, providing hands-on training. Theoretical lessons covered the history of Dhaka weaving, traditional designs, color theory, and market trends, enriched by interactive discussions and demonstrations. Additionally, ROYM Nepal conducted an orientation program on gender-based violence (GBV) and human trafficking prevention (HTPS).

The 3-month Dhaka Weaving Training was a resounding success, empowering women with valuable skills, fostering economic independence, and contributing to cultural preservation and community development. By investing in skills training and empowerment initiatives for women, opportunities for sustainable development and inclusive growth are created.

Reuniting Families, Restoring Hope: ROYM Nepal's Mission Accomplished, May 17, 2024, Sunauli



The open border between Nepal and India has served as a gateway for the people of both nations to lead their lives and earn a livelihood. Recently, 44 workers from the Mahottari, Sarlahi, Dhanusha districts, and other districts of Nepal faced harsh realities. These individuals, who had traveled to Jammu and Kashmir in India for employment four months ago, found themselves in a quandary, having started work at a company but not receiving their monthly wages, nor being allowed to return home.

In light of this situation, ROYM Nepal became aware of this issue and embarked on a mission. With our initiative, and the support of Bardibas Municipality, the respective ward, and a social worker, we were able to reach them through Delhi, India. We have successfully reunited them with their families, safely and securely.

One-day health Camp Report on Non-Communicable Diseases, May 21, 2024, Dhading



The health camp on non-communicable diseases (NCDs) was conducted at Nilakantha Municipality Ward No. 5 and Netrawoti Dobjung Rural Municipality Ward No. 5 in collaboration with the Public Health Office, Dhading, the NGO-Federation of Dhading, and with technical support from the Health Department of both municipalities. A total of 306 individuals received health screenings during the camp. The aim of the camp was to raise awareness about non-communicable diseases, their risk factors, prevention, and management among the local community.

Activities conducted included health screenings such as blood pressure measurement, blood glucose testing, body mass index (BMI) calculation, waist circumference measurement, and sugar percentage measurement. Educational sessions were held to discuss the causes and consequences of NCDs, provide information on healthy lifestyle choices,

and offer counseling on smoking cessation and alcohol moderation. Informational materials, including brochures and pamphlets on NCD prevention and management, as well as posters displaying key messages on healthy living, were distributed. Participants also had the opportunity to consult with healthcare professionals regarding their health concerns and receive personalized advice.

The health camp attracted participants from various age groups and backgrounds, including adults and elderly members of the community. Key findings from the camp revealed a high prevalence of hypertension, elevated blood glucose levels, and a considerable number of overweight or obese participants. Additionally, several attendees expressed limited knowledge about NCDs and their risk factors, highlighting the need for ongoing education and awareness campaigns.

Recommendations from the camp included implementing regular health camps and educational workshops to continue raising awareness about NCDs, fostering partnerships with local healthcare providers, schools, and community organizations to extend the reach of NCD prevention initiatives, and offering follow-up consultations and support services to individuals identified with NCD risk factors to facilitate behavior change and adherence to treatment plans.

The health camp on non-communicable diseases served as a valuable platform for promoting health awareness and disease prevention within the community. By addressing risk factors and empowering individuals to make healthier choices, we can work towards reducing the burden of non-communicable diseases and improving overall well-being.

Rebuilding with Love, May 21, 2024, Matihani



On April 24, a huge fire affected Jaralhawa Tole and Miya Tole in Ward 6 of Matihani Municipality in Mahottari, destroying 104 homes. ROYM-Nepal had provided immediate relief in support of AEIN to those affected. During this humanitarian aid, we felt that the incident had left children the most vulnerable. So, in an attempt to meet their needs, we have created a child-friendly space. This is our attempt to ensure that no child is left behind in the wake of a disaster. It is the place where they can learn, play, and socialize at the same time. Our child friendly space is also helping them to deal with psychosocial problems caused by the disaster and return to normalcy. Here, they feel loved and cured in a safe

environment where they can also learn by engaging in fun activities.

Three days' Citrus fruit farming training program, May 27, 2024, Dhading



ROYM Nepal Dhading branch organized a three-day Citrus Fruit Farming Training Program starting on May 27, 2024. The training aimed to equip participants with comprehensive knowledge and practical skills necessary for successful citrus cultivation, covering aspects such as cultivation techniques, pest and disease management, post-harvest handling, and market strategies. The event was inaugurated by Ward Chairperson Mr. Hari Adhikari, who emphasized the importance of regular and active participation.

The objectives of the training were to familiarize participants with citrus cultivation practices, provide basic knowledge for orange orchard establishment, maximize yield per unit area, improve fruit quality, promote sustainable farming practices, and contribute to the socio-economic development of citrus-growing communities.

The first day covered an overview of citrus varieties, site selection, soil preparation, and planting techniques. PJTA Gopal Shrestha introduced citrus fruits, their importance, and scopes. The session included practical demonstrations on proper planting techniques.

The second day focused on identifying common pests and diseases, integrated pest management (IPM), and disease prevention strategies. Participants learned about symptoms of pests and diseases, environmentally friendly pest control methods, and the importance of sanitation, pruning, and proper irrigation.

The final day covered harvesting and handling practices, packaging and storage, and marketing strategies. Participants learned about the optimum time for harvesting, proper handling to minimize damage, and strategies for accessing local and international markets.

Throughout the training, participants engaged in practical sessions, including land selection for orange orchards, nursery establishment, grafting techniques, and compost manure making. The training also included sessions on bio-pesticide preparation, income and expense record keeping, and business plan development.

Conduction of Menstruation Hygiene Day, May 28, 2024, Rautahat



The Menstruation Hygiene Day was celebrated on May 28, 2024, with the theme “Together for a Period-Friendly World.” The event featured orientation and interaction programs held in Guraja-1 and Brindaban-7 of Rautahat District. A total of 264 participants attended, including 245 females and 19 males, with the majority being adolescent girls.

The program aimed to raise awareness about the social taboos and beliefs surrounding menstruation that need to be challenged and changed. It also sought to increase participants’ knowledge about the menstrual cycle and hygiene management. Participants were encouraged to understand the importance of necessary menstrual products, period education, and period-friendly infrastructure.

Additionally, the program provided valuable information on anti-trafficking, self-defense, and awareness to help

adolescents understand their rights and the importance of education. This comprehensive approach ensured that participants left with a well-rounded understanding of both menstrual hygiene and their broader rights and protections.

Agri-Input Support for Farmers Group Plastic Tunnel with Drip Irrigation set, May 29, 2024, Dhading



On May 15 and 29, 2024, ROYM Nepal organized an agri-input support event in Netrawoti Dobjung Rural Municipality Ward No. 5, Katunje Bazaar, and Nilkantha Municipality Ward No. 5, Khalte, with financial support from AEIN. The event aimed to introduce rural farmers to the benefits of plastic tunnels and provide them with the necessary support to set up and utilize these structures effectively. Plastic tunnels, also known as hoop houses or polytunnels, offer a cost-effective solution for extending the growing season, protecting crops from adverse weather conditions, and optimizing yield potential.

The event commenced with training sessions and practical demonstrations on

the installation, management, and maintenance of plastic tunnels and drip irrigation systems. Agricultural experts provided insights into selecting suitable site locations, construction materials, and optimal tunnel designs tailored to local agro-climatic conditions. Experienced technicians and extension workers were on hand to provide technical assistance and guidance to farmers throughout the process. The event also served as a platform for knowledge sharing and networking among farmers, researchers, and agricultural practitioners.

The support process included identifying the needs and interests of farmers, obtaining approvals and recommendations from local authorities, conducting field visits for confirmation, and supplying the necessary inputs. Supported agriculture inputs included silpoulin plastic for plastic houses, GI wire, drip irrigation sets, mulching plastic, rope, yellow sticky traps, lures, tomato seeds and vitamins.

Key takeaways from the support event highlighted the effectiveness of providing support to dedicated farmers and the positive impact of small but important assistance in motivating and benefiting needy farmers. The plastic tunnel support event represents a significant step towards promoting sustainable agriculture and empowering rural farming communities. By equipping farmers with the knowledge, skills, and resources needed to harness the potential of plastic tunnel farming, we lay

the foundation for inclusive rural development and food security

Seed Money Support Program, May 29, 2024, Dhading

The Seed Money Support for Farmers event was organized on May 15 and 29, 2024, at Netrawoti Dobjung and Nilakantha Municipality Ward No. 5, with the aim of providing financial assistance to farmers to kickstart agricultural projects, enhance productivity, and improve livelihoods. The event sought to address the financial challenges faced by farmers and empower them to invest in their agricultural endeavors.

The objectives of the program were to provide financial assistance to help farmers start new agricultural ventures or improve existing ones, empower farmers, improve agricultural productivity and sustainability, and contribute to rural development and their socio-economic empowerment. The program also aimed to support smallholder farmers by providing initial capital to start income-generating agricultural activities, strengthen the capacity of farmers through training and technical assistance, and encourage agricultural entrepreneurship.

The Seed Money Support for Farmers event was instrumental in providing financial assistance, training, and capacity building to farmers, enabling them to improve agricultural productivity, enhance livelihoods, and build resilient communities. By investing in agriculture and empowering

farmers, we can contribute to sustainable development, food security, and poverty alleviation.

Quarterly Group Meeting and Orientation on Gender-Based Violence (GBV), May 29, 2024, Dhading

On May 29, 2024, ROYM Nepal conducted a quarterly group meeting and orientation on gender-based violence (GBV) in Dhading, involving 70 group representatives from both Nilkantha and Netrawoti Ward No. 5. This meeting underscored the group's commitment to addressing critical community needs, empowering women, and fostering a safer and more inclusive environment. The objectives were to review progress on women's health rights initiatives, provide education on GBV issues, enhance the group's capacity to address GBV, and plan future activities integrating GBV awareness and advocacy.

The event began with ROYM Nepal District Coordinator Mr. Harisharan Dhital welcoming all group members and conducting an introduction program. A summary of activities and achievements since the last meeting was presented, followed by discussions on successes, challenges, and lessons learned. Facilitators conducted a session on GBV, covering definitions, types, prevalence, and the impact on women's health and well-being. Training needs for group members related to GBV advocacy and support were

identified, and potential partnerships with local organizations specializing in GBV prevention and response were discussed.

The orientation included presentations on the different forms of GBV, discussions on the root causes and contributing factors, and an overview of the profound effects of GBV on survivors and communities. Legal frameworks and support services for survivors were explained, and prevention strategies and interventions were explored. An empowerment session focused on the role of community leaders and advocates in combating GBV, with strategies for raising awareness and promoting survivor-centered responses.

The meeting concluded with the definition of action points and responsibilities for implementing GBV-related activities, and the establishment of timelines and milestones for upcoming events and initiatives. The quarterly meeting and orientation on GBV provided a platform for group members to deepen their understanding of GBV issues and integrate this knowledge into their advocacy for women's health rights. The session underscored the importance of community-driven initiatives in combating GBV and supporting survivors effectively.

Fencing of the site for community based multi-purpose nursery, June 1 , 2024, Saptari



The project implemented area faces the problem of inundation so it was mandatory for us to select the Nursery site area little bit higher altitude for community-based nursery than average land altitude. So, the Rajendra Devaki School's Pond perimeter was selected for this purpose. This site is higher in altitude than surrounding and there is no problem of inundation here and around 3 kaththas of land is available for the nursery purpose. The area was fenced properly and the nursery works like preparation of seedling bed, germination house, germination bed etc. will be done once the monsoon season is over. We feel accomplished that at least the fencing of the Nursery site was complete.

Mobile Repairing Training to Repair the Mobile Phone Software, June 2 , 2024, Mahottari



The mobile repairing training has been planned to enhanced socio-economic status through economic empowerment of backward people including women, youths through increasing access to services, resources and economic opportunities at local level. By analysis of training period, project location and budget of the program, the training has been planned to provide training to members of youth group of Bangaha-3 and 5 of Mahottari district. There are altogether 18 youths including 4 girls and 14 boys' participants in the training facilitated by the trainer with supportive materials. The training was started on 2nd June, 2024 for 65 days with an objective to well equip participants with basic knowledge and professional skills of repair and maintenance of mobile phones. In the same way, the participants must be able to identify and describe functions of passive and active components, perform general repair of mobile phone components, describe architecture and classification of mobile phones and troubleshoot mobile

phones by the completion of training. The youth who are interested to receive the skills that can help them to start your own business and work for a company are selected to be trainee of the training program. At the present, they are learning basic skills in electronics, hardware, software, and communication and getting familiar with essential tools like soldering iron, multimeter, screwdriver set, etc.

Group formation and Orientation to the Farmers Groups and other Community People on Social Transformation, Harmful Traditional Practices and Socio-Justice, June 5, 2024, Rautahat

In total 250 members including are present in eight groups of women group, women farmers group, farmers group and youth group. The formation of group started for 23rd April and ended on 5th June, 2024. For the group formation guideline were developed to ensure the target beneficiaries from disadvantaged and marginalized communities and with ethnicity (Dalit, Janjati, Muslim). There was a discussion and interaction with ward members and community people, which lead to survey the target area of project and communicate for situation analysis.

Women who are engaged in domestic work and in agricultural work are present in these groups. Similarly, the guideline has prioritized to have member, who are single and have faced social abuse, violence as well as economically weak.

Youth groups are formed to create awareness against HTPs (Harmful Traditional Practices) and GBV (Gender based violence), improving access to quality SRHR (Sexual and Reproductive Health Rights) and improving local governance.

The meeting and orientation were conducted in women group, women farmers group, Farmer group and Youth Group. Among the women group the issue of gender based violence, child marriage, reproductive health, safe motherhood and menstruation period were discussed during orientation. The information about the nurse bed and its type, the practice of using nurse bed according to the season and goat farming practices and its importance was shared among farmers group. With the objective to increase the knowledge on adolescent period the orientation was conducted among the youth group. Similarly, pre-test and post-test are also carried out to evaluate the performance of participants in the program.

ROYM Nepal, under the project entitled: "EKATA; Campaign for solidarity and Promotion of young human rights defenders" organized a one day workshop focused on mapping Young human rights defenders. The workshop aimed to identify the district level young human right defenders from the groups/ clubs that has been working by district level civil society organizations, NGO federation, journalists, women human right defenders (WHRDs) and others relevant stakeholders. The Young Human Rights Defenders Networks Mapping workshop served as a platform to

ROYM Nepal marked World Environment Day 2024 with a plantation program at Shree Rajendra Devaki Higher Secondary School. The event, themed “Our Commitment: Land Restoration, Desertification, and Drought Resilience,” aimed to raise environmental awareness and promote sustainable practices among students and staff.

The program began with a formal session hosted by the DCP of the Saksham Saptari Project. Key figures, including the Chairperson of the School Management Committee, Mr. Raj Kumar Mandal, and the Principal, Mr. Dipendra Jha, addressed the attendees. Following the speeches, participants, including students from grades 9 and 10, engaged in a plantation activity, emphasizing the importance of land restoration and environmental stewardship.

The event successfully highlighted the benefits of plantation and fostered a sense of responsibility towards the environment among the young participants.

Moving forward, the data collected and connections established during this workshop will contribute significantly to the formation of strong and effective Young Human Rights Defenders alliance in the district.

Clean Our Community Campaign Launch, June 12, 2024, Saptari



We started a new campaign, "Clean our community," from Maa Bhagawati Farmers Group, Mukhiyatole in Tilathi Koiladi RMP -04, Saptari. We have planned to provide social points to the members who actively participate in this awareness and cleanliness campaign. These social points will be calculated to provide technical as well as seed and material support from the Saksham Saptari Project. This campaign will be implemented in all our working areas.

AEIN Luxembourg's and ROYM Nepal's Team Visit to Dhading, June 12, 2024, Dhading



A team from AEIN Luxembourg, accompanied by representatives from ROYM Nepal, visited the JIBIKA Project in Dhading on June 2.

The JIBIKA Project stands as a testament to sustainable development and community empowerment. Initiated by ROYM Nepal with the support of AEIN Luxembourg, the project has been a catalyst for change in the Dhading, transforming lives through implementing activities to enhance livelihood opportunities and empower marginalized communities.

The delegation was greeted with a warm welcome, adorned with garlands and

traditional Dhaka shawls handwoven by the beneficiaries, which set the tone for a day of meaningful engagement and cultural exchange at the Dhaka weaving center in Katunje, Netrawati Dabjong Rural Municipality.

Lubha Raj Neupane, Executive Director of ROYM Nepal, introduced the visitors to the project's core activities, emphasizing the management's focus on sustainable practices and women's empowerment.

"We will be here for three years, and if we continue to work with dedication, we can extend our efforts up to six or even nine years. It's all about perseverance," Neupane stated, reflecting on the organization's commitment emphasizing the long-term vision for the JIBIKA Project.

The Vice Mayor and Ward Chairs, present alongside, echoed the sentiments of gratitude for the community's achievements.

The Vice Mayor, Sitamaya Gurung, expressed, "It's great to have a program like this for the betterment of the municipality's people. Although Dhading is the closest district to Kathmandu, the market access for its residents is still not adequate. The Dhaka weaving training has greatly assisted the beneficiaries, and I request an extension of this program."

The Ward Chairperson, Hari Adhikari, remarked, "We are extremely grateful for such initiatives that have been introduced

during our tenure. We are dedicated to supporting these efforts, ensuring they have a lasting and positive impact."

The AEIN Team engaged with the Dhaka Weaving Community. Françoise Binsfeld, Executive Director of AEIN Luxembourg, inquired into the production and potential expansion of Dhaka products. Her interest in diversifying the artisans' skills to include blouses and sarees could further enrich the local craftsmanship.

Binsfeld, expressed her admiration for the project's impact. "The quality of Dhaka fabric here is remarkable. We're exploring how to enhance the production process. Whether it takes three months or six, we will facilitate training to refine these beautiful patterns," Binsfeld said.

Binsfeld's interaction with the artisans revealed a vision for the future. "How can we improve the quality of Dhaka? How can we expedite the process without compromising on quality?" she inquired.

The artisans' aspirations for greater access to raw materials and market opportunities were palpable." After three months of training, we can inquire about the cost of producing a tan of Dhaka fabric and even consider home-based production," Binsfeld added.

The day's dialogue also surfaced a burgeoning demand for training in woolen work, tailoring, poultry farming, citrus

farming, and soap making, reflecting the community's drive to embrace a multitude of entrepreneurial ventures.

As the visit progressed to Reep village, the team was embraced by the Tamang culture's warmth and hospitality. The villagers' advocacy for declaring the area a citrus zone to promote the local orange variety highlighted the agricultural richness and potential of the region.

During a visit to Nischal Tole, the AEIN and ROYM Nepal team witnessed the beneficial effects of new tools—a Grinding Machine and a Welding Machine—provided to four individuals.

Artisans shared their experiences, noting that the machines have made their work much easier. "With these machines, we can do our work faster and with better quality," said one artisan.

The artisans also showcased their handcrafted tools and implements, including knives, spades, and traditional Nepali khukuris, demonstrating the skills and craftsmanship that have been passed down through generations.

The following day, the delegation ventured to Nilkantha-5, where the community's was enthusiastic. The meeting room at the Ward Office in Fakshe Tole was filled with participants keen to discuss their experiences and hopes with the team from AEIN Luxembourg and ROYM Nepal.

Participants in the program have expressed their appreciation for the support provided by ROYM Nepal. “Since the arrival of ROYM Nepal in our ward, we’ve seen remarkable improvements,” shared a local farmer. “The seed money has improved our animal sheds and has also helped us develop a farm.”

Women from eight different agricultural groups shared their experiences and aspirations with the AEIN team. They expressed a keen interest in new programs and conveyed their requests for continued support in various farming activities.

Participants voiced their needs for assistance in vegetable farming, goat rearing, dairy farming, poultry, and pig farming. The lack of irrigation and the need for water collection to sustain vegetable cultivation were highlighted as critical issues.

The community also requested support for ginger farming, which has been successful in the area but faces challenges due to lack of proper storage facilities. Technical support for potato farming and other crops was also sought to improve yield and quality.

Binsfeld, reflecting on the discussions, emphasized the importance of collective action. “While individual support is crucial, it is the collective requests that we can address more effectively. We encourage you to present your needs together for a stronger impact,” she advised.

The visit concluded with a tour of the improved animal shed and a short cliffside trip, symbolizing the project’s impact and the promising future that lies ahead for the people of Dhading.

Young Human Rights Defenders Alliance formation, June 14, 2024, Salyan

Young Human Rights Defenders Networks Mapping, June 17, 2024, Dailekh



ROYM Nepal, under the project entitled: "EKATA; Campaign for solidarity and Promotion of young human rights defenders" organized a one day workshop focused on mapping Young

human rights defenders. The workshop aimed to identify the district level young human right defenders from the groups/ clubs that has been working by district level civil society organizations, NGO . The Young Human Rights Defenders Networks Mapping workshop served as a platform to foster collaboration among various stakeholders and identified active, energetic, dynamic, committed in their groups/clubs. Moving forward, the data collected and connections established during this workshop will contribute significantly to the formation of strong and effective Young Human rights Defenders alliance in the district.

Workshop on Organizing Advocacy Skill-Building for the District-level Working Women’s Network, June 17, 2024, Rautahat



A three-day workshop on organizing and advocacy skill-building for the district-level working women’s network was successfully completed, with the participation of 30 working women from each municipality of Rautahat District. The working women’s network has been established to develop an advocacy and organizing plan aimed at

creating workers' collectives at the district level and linking their efforts at both local and national levels.

The workshop capacitated 30 working women on advocacy skills, including those from targeted groups. The sessions began with self-awareness exercises, identifying challenges and problems, exploring solutions, and discussing leadership and the Labour Act of Nepal. The focus was on dignified and equal wages for the same work and the rights of laborers in the non-formal sector. Activities included group work, presentations, and interactive discussions among participants.

The workshop, held in Chandrapur, Rautahat from June 10-12, 2024, was facilitated by ED Lubha Raj Neupane, Local Resource Person Bibek Jha, and DPC. A significant component of the workshop was raising awareness about anti-trafficking measures, ensuring that participants understood the importance of protecting themselves and their communities from trafficking.

The objective of the orientation was to increase participants' knowledge about rights, women's rights, and legal provisions for equity as outlined in the Interim Constitution 2063. Pre-test and post-test results showed a significant increase in knowledge among participants, from an average of 22.25% in the pre-test to 80% in the post-test across six municipalities.

Three-days Entrepreneurship Development Training for Start-up Business Start-up Personnel, June 18, 2024, Dhading



From June 16 to 18, 2024, ROYM Nepal's Dhading project office conducted a comprehensive three-day Entrepreneurship Development Training at Hotel JIBIKA, Nilakantha Municipality Ward No. 3, Dhading Beshi. The training aimed to equip 25 rural farmers from two municipalities with essential skills and knowledge to foster entrepreneurial ventures and cultivate a culture of innovation and business acumen. The objectives of the training were to equip participants with practical skills for developing business ideas into viable ventures, enhance their understanding of key entrepreneurial concepts, empower them to navigate business challenges, inspire them with success stories, and provide practical exercises to apply theoretical knowledge.

The training began with District Project Coordinator Mr. Harisharan Dhital welcoming participants and introducing ROYM Nepal and the JIBIKA Project. Vice

Chairperson of Netrawoti Dobjung Rural Municipality, Miss Sita Maya Gurung, and Ward Chairperson of Nilakantha, Mr. Ram Bdr. Shrestha, were special guests. Mr. Shrestha shared examples of successful entrepreneurs and emphasized the municipality's support for rural women's socio-economic empowerment. The training was facilitated by Mr. Megnath Gautha, Industry Officer of the Cottage and Small Industry Dhading, and Mr. Harisharan Dhital.

The second day focused on translating ideas into viable business plans and managing entrepreneurial ventures. Sessions included creating a business model canvas, financial planning, and understanding legal and regulatory compliance. Participants engaged in practical business plan preparation exercises.

The final day emphasized marketing strategies, sales techniques, and pitching business ideas to investors. Participants learned about digital marketing, branding, customer acquisition, effective sales strategies, and negotiation skills. They also prepared and delivered elevator pitches, receiving constructive feedback from mentors.

The Entrepreneurship Development Training concluded with participants gaining practical insights, networking opportunities, and renewed enthusiasm for entrepreneurial endeavors. Feedback

highlighted the value of hands-on activities, expert insights, and peer learning. Certificates were distributed to acknowledge participants' commitment and successful completion of the program.

Three days' Commercial Vegetable Training Program, June 21, 2024, Dhading



ROYM Nepal organized a three-day commercial vegetable farming training program starting on June 21, 2024. The training aimed to equip 25 participants from six farmer groups in Neelkantha-5 and 26 participants from various farmer groups in Netrawoti Dobjung RM with modern vegetable farming techniques.

The objectives of the training were to provide participants with a comprehensive understanding of vegetable farming practices, enable hands-on experience in essential farming activities, educate on sustainable agricultural practices, introduce

farm economics and marketing strategies, and empower participants to start or improve their vegetable farming enterprises.

First day began with District Program Coordinator Mr. Harisharan Dhital welcoming participants and introducing ROYM Nepal and the JIBIKA Project. PJTA Gopal Shrestha provided an overview of vegetable farming, its importance, and scopes, along with nursery bed preparation and management techniques. Practical exercises on land selection and nursery bed establishment were conducted.

The second day focused on main field preparation, transplanting techniques, and required fertilizer doses. Participants learned about cultural operations, irrigation management, and the preparation and use of bio-pesticides and pit manure. The day concluded with a review of the sessions.

The final day covered the identification and management of diseases, insects, and pests in vegetable fields. Participants learned about compost manure making, bio-pesticide preparation, and application methods. Sessions on record keeping, income and expenditure management, and business planning were also conducted. The training concluded with discussions on harvesting, grading, storage, marketing, and transportation techniques.

Based on participant feedback, future training sessions could incorporate climate-resilient farming techniques, provide in-

depth training on high-value vegetable crops, and offer follow-up support or mentoring.

The three-day commercial vegetable farming training program successfully equipped participants with comprehensive knowledge and practical skills essential for establishing and managing successful vegetable farming enterprises. Continued support and follow-up sessions will be crucial to ensure the application of learned techniques and the success of vegetable growers in their respective endeavors

Three days commercial Livestock farming training program, June 21, 2024, Dhading



ROYM Nepal organized a three-day commercial livestock farming training program starting on June 21, 2024. The training aimed to equip 27 participants from various farmer groups in Neelkantha-5 with commercial goat farming techniques.

The session began with VJTA Mr. Bijay Tamang welcoming participants and introducing ROYM Nepal and the JIBIKA Project. District Program Coordinator

Harisaran Dhital provided an overview of the importance and scope of commercial cattle farming, including the current status and challenges in Nepal. Participants learned about local and exotic breeds of cows and buffaloes, livestock insurance terms, and the preparation and management of feed and forage. The day concluded with a review session.

The second day started with a review of the previous day's session. VJTA Bijay Tamang conducted a class on the gestation period, major problems in pregnancy, and the importance of artificial insemination. Practical exercises on silage making were included. Neelkantha Municipality livestock development officer Mr. Prakash Luitel and livestock technician Mr. Ashok Sharma Duwadi provided insights into shed hygiene, internal and external parasites, diseases, pest management, and dairy production. The day ended with a review session.

The final day began with a review of the previous day's activities. VJTA Tamang led discussions on commercial cattle farming techniques, record keeping, market strategies, and transportation methods. The training concluded with appraisals and closing remarks by Ward Member.

The training included group divisions, session rules, collection of queries, and detailed sessions on various aspects of commercial livestock farming. Practical exercises and reviews were conducted to reinforce learning.

Three Days' Commercial Goat Farming Training Program, June 25, 2024, Dhading



ROYM Nepal organized a three-day commercial goat farming training program, inviting 33 participants from various farmer groups in Netrawoti Dobjung RM. The training aimed to empower participants with the necessary tools and knowledge to become successful and informed goat farmers, capable of contributing positively to the agricultural sector and their local economies.

The session began with Veterinary Junior Technical Assistant (VJTA) welcoming participants and introducing ROYM Nepal and the JIBIKA Project. The session covered the importance and scope of commercial goat farming in Nepal, including the history, current situation, and challenges. Participants learned about local and exotic goat breeds, internal and external parasites, and methods for their control and management. The day concluded with a review of the session.

The second day started with a review of the

previous day's session. VJTA conducted a class on the care and management of bucks, does, pregnant does, and kids.

Participants learned to identify healthy and sick goats and manage their health. Netrawoti Dobjung livestock technician Mr. Nirmal Chaudhary provided insights into diseases, pests, and their control methods. The day ended with a review session.

The final day began with a review of the previous day's activities. VJTA of Ward No. 5, Miss Sunita Maya Shrestha, led a session on managing goat feed and forage, preparing balanced diets, and biosecurity measures. Participants discussed commercial goat farming techniques, record keeping, market strategies, and transportation methods.

The three-day commercial goat farming training program successfully provided participants with a comprehensive understanding of all aspects of goat farming, from basic husbandry practices to advanced business strategies. Participants expressed satisfaction with the depth of knowledge gained and the practical nature of the training. The program was instrumental in promoting sustainable and profitable goat farming practices among aspiring farmers.

Women Fund Asia

Field Survey for Group Formation, *April 1, 2024, Rautahat*



The Working Women groups will be formed in one ward of each of the six municipalities in Rautahat district: Chandrapur, Garuda, Gujara, Brindaban, Madhab Narayan, and Gaur. These areas have a high number of diversified working women's groups. The selection criteria include women from disadvantaged and marginalized communities, aged 18-45, and from ethnicities such as Dalit, Janjati, and Muslim. The women should be engaged in domestic work, labor work, bidi and cigarette making, market selling, goat rearing, agriculture, small entrepreneurship, and the entertainment sector. Priority is given to women who are single, have faced social abuse and violence, and are economically weak. A guideline for group formation was created, followed by discussions and interactions with ward members and community people to survey the target area and communicate with beneficiaries. During the field visit and survey, information was shared among the community about the importance of group formation.

Collection of Field Profile Data, *April 4, 2024, Rautahat*



A comprehensive list of available groups and networks within the project area was compiled. This included Women's Groups, HRD Networks, Youth Groups, Mixed Farmers Groups, Women Farmers Groups, Returnee Migrant Workers Groups, mothers' groups, youth clubs, and child clubs. The functional status of these groups was assessed, and the originators were listed. Additionally, the number of NGOs/INGOs working in the project location was identified, along with the total number of households. Some of the organizations present in the area include CDP, RDC Nepal, Heifer, Bagmati Sewa Samaj, Rastriya Dalit Network, SODCC, Gharivi Nibarana, Sana Kisan Sahakari, RDC, Aasaman Nepal, and Abiyan Nepal. This data collection is crucial for understanding the community dynamics and planning targeted interventions.

Orientation and Workshop, April 8-9, 2024, Rautahat



An orientation program was held on April 8 and 9, 2024, for the project staff of ROYM Nepal and the WFA-supported program team. The program aimed to share the project background and review previous activities. Organizational details, project objectives, activities, and budget were presented. A field visit was conducted, allowing for interactions with community members and local stakeholders. Following the orientation, a two-day workshop provided participants with the knowledge and skills necessary to lead the project effectively. The workshop focused on preparing the annual plan, discussing project activities, implementation processes, and responsibilities. It concluded with a session on working women's rights and legal provisions. The interactive sessions and practical exercises ensured that the staff were well-prepared to implement the project successfully.

Group Formation, April 11-30, 2024, Rautahat



A total of 279 women became members of 11 Working Women Groups (WWG) formed in six municipalities of Rautahat district. The groups were formed following a guideline to ensure the inclusion of working women from disadvantaged and marginalized communities. The members are primarily engaged in domestic work, labor work, factory work, agriculture, small entrepreneurship, and entertainment sectors. These groups serve as platforms for women to voice their concerns, share experiences, and support each other in their professional and personal lives.

Celebration of International Labor Day, May 1, 2024, Brindaban



International Labor Day was celebrated on May 1, 2024, in Brindaban-7, Rautahat district, under the theme 'Advancing social justice, and promoting decent work'. The event, chaired by the Mayor of Brindaban Municipality, aimed to raise awareness about the contributions of workers to society. The program included discussions on the theme, history, and significance of International Labor Day, women's rights to work, and necessary policy changes for gender-friendly provisions. A total of 197 people participated, including 129 females and 68 males. The event featured interactions with laborers, especially women groups, and a rally advocating for workers' rights, fair wages, and improved working conditions. The rally and discussions highlighted the importance of recognizing and valuing the contributions of all workers, particularly women, in building a just and equitable society.

Advocacy Workshop, June 10-12, 2024, Chandrapur



An advocacy workshop was held from June 10-12, 2024, in Chandrapur, Rautahat, capacitating thirty working women. The workshop focused on self-awareness,

It emphasized dignified and equal wages for the same work and the rights of women laborers in the non-formal sector. The workshop included group work, presentations, and interactive sessions facilitated by in-house staff and a local resource person.

Formation of District Level WWG, June 12, 2024, Rautahat



Following the advocacy workshop, a district-level working women network was formed on June 12, 2024, with 15 members from 11 WWGs. This network aims to amplify the collective efforts of workers, raise their voices at the district level, and link their synergy at local and national levels. The network also developed its annual action plan to guide its activities.

Orientation on Women's Rights and Legal Provisions, June 14-24, 2024, Rautahat



From June 14 to June 24, 2024, all members of the 10 WWGs from the targeted municipalities were oriented on women's rights and legal provisions. A total of 254 women were sensitized during these orientations. The objective was to increase knowledge about rights, women's rights to work, and legal provisions of equity according to the Interim Constitution 2063. Pretest and post-test results showed a significant increase in knowledge among participants, from an average of 22.25% in the pre-test to 80% in the post-test across six municipalities.

COMMUNITY VOICES

Nurturing Resilience Amidst Challenge: Momani Devi Ram Case Study



In the remote village of Tilathi Koiladi Rural Municipality-4, Ram Tole, Saptari, lives Momani Devi Ram, a 42-year-old marginalized woman whose life story reflects the resilience and challenges of many rural women in Nepal. Momani's journey from childhood to adulthood, marked by early marriage, economic hardship, and the impacts of climate change, provides a profound insight into the socio-economic and environmental realities of her community.

She was born and raised in Goethi, a remote village in Saptari, about 8 kilometers east of Rajbiraj. Her childhood was typical of many in rural Nepal, spent grazing livestock and assisting with household chores.

Despite her parents' encouragement to pursue education, the distant school and the harsh discipline from teachers led her to drop out. At the tender age of eight, Momani's marriage was arranged, a

common practice known as Duraagman, where young brides return to their parents' home until they reach an age deemed suitable to join their husbands permanently. By 15, Momani had returned to her in-laws' home, where she began her journey as a wife and homemaker.

Reflecting on this period, she said, "My early marriage was a significant turning point in my life. Although it was challenging, it taught me resilience."

Momani's family has lived in Tilathi Koiladi, for generations. The family owns their house and primarily relies on agricultural farming and seasonal construction work in both local and major cities like Kathmandu and Pokhara for their livelihood.

She explained, "Economic stability is a constant challenge. Surplus agricultural produce is sold in nearby markets to meet household needs, but during lean seasons, the family depends on loans from local lenders."

Momani's family comprises six members: her husband, son and daughter-in-law, daughter, and a grandson. The household has remained free from domestic violence and substance abuse, which has fostered a supportive and resilient environment. A significant personal challenge for Momani was her initial inability to conceive. After various treatments and religious rituals, she gave birth to her first child at the age of 25.

The responsibilities of raising her children and managing household duties have driven her to work tirelessly.

She shared, “Motherhood brought immense joy but also tremendous responsibility. It pushed me to work harder for a better future for my children.”

In her society, access to education and healthcare remains limited due to the distance to the nearest school and health post. Over time, Momani has witnessed significant social changes, especially regarding caste-based discrimination.

She observed, “While untouchability and restrictions on freedom of expression were prevalent during my youth, these issues have considerably diminished. Community functions now see greater cooperation among different castes, although some traditions, like separate food preparation, persist but are gradually changing.”

Over the years, Momani has observed the changing climate's adverse effects on agriculture and health. Extreme droughts, flooding, increased pest infestations, and diseases in animals have become more frequent, severely impacting their agricultural productivity.

The family cultivates 10 Kathhas (0.165 acres) of leased land. She noted, “Despite the lease, we treat it as our own, reflecting our deep connection to farming. These environmental challenges have made

sustaining our livelihood increasingly difficult.”

Momani has participated in various trainings, including informal education, vegetable cultivation, livestock management, and climate change orientation. She is skilled in knitting and weaving, a craft she learned from her elders. Her daughter-in-law also excels in sewing and knitting. They hope to receive support for resources like sewing machines and knitting equipment to enhance their economic opportunities and improve their livelihood.

Five years ago, Momani suffered a severe illness, requiring extensive and costly medical treatment. This period was financially and emotionally taxing for the family. Upon her recovery two years ago, they turned to vegetable farming to sustain themselves.

She explained, “The family maintains hope and resilience by staying calm, working hard, and focusing on their responsibilities. Our collective efforts and faith have helped us navigate through difficult times.”

Momani is actively involved in the Saksham Saptari Project (an ongoing project of ROYM Nepal), which she learned about through initial meetings with ROYM Nepal's project staff. She has participated in orientations on climate change, vegetable farming, and the use of irrigation techniques like boring and water pumps.

She stated, “The project has significantly raised my awareness about climate change and its impacts and has provided practical solutions to cope with these challenges.”

The Saksham Project has fostered community cooperation through the formation of a women's group. This group has enhanced communication, cooperation, and assistance among members, strengthening community resilience.

Momani appreciates the project's activities. She expressed, “The Saksham project has helped me a lot to sustain living, but I hope for more fundamental support along with the numerous trainings.”

Momani Devi Ram's story is a testament to the resilience and adaptability of rural women in Nepal. Her life, marked by early marriage, economic hardships, climate challenges, and social transformation, underscores the importance of targeted interventions and community support for sustainable development. This story of Momani highlights her struggles and triumphs but also calls for continued and enhanced support to uplift the lives of women like her and communities.

Resilience Amidst Difficulty: The Story of Shanta Roka



In Nilkantha-5, Palapali Tole, Dhading lives a 25-year-old Dalit woman named Shanta Roka. Her life shows strong hope and courage, even when times are hard. Shanta, a mother of one child and a resident of Tole for five years, lives with her husband, who works as a driver. They have their own home away from other family members, which sometimes makes Shanta feel lonely.

In her home, where peace should be a constant, the calm is too often broken by violence between husband and wife. These are caused by her husband's struggle with alcohol, which leads him to act harmfully. Their family's financial security is at risk as well. Instead of providing for their needs, he uses the money to feed his addiction, leaving little for anything else. This neglect has put a strain on their daily lives and their future.

She said, “Inside our home, there are arguments because of alcohol. True strength is not always about shouting; it's about the silent promise to look after my child.”

This makes it tough to take care of her child's health and schooling. In her community, there's also the issue of too many people having to share one toilet.

She expressed, "Having our own toilet is important. It means we can have our own space. Using the same toilet as everyone else is hard."

Expressing about the community, she said, "Our place, Nilkantha-5, is like a family that supports each other. But, when we visit some other advanced areas, there are still old, unfair beliefs about caste that separate us."

She added, "Here there are schools and health centers; they are like a light of hope for us. Yet, the struggle to get rid of poverty is a big challenge."

Shanta has a dream of a safe home without fights and drinking problems. She wants to use her talents in knitting and raising buffalo to make a better life. She thinks that if she could get a buffalo, it would help her economically by selling milk. She is enthusiastic to learn these skills well, and they give her hope that she can take care of herself and her family.

She expressed, "Life is hard, but I stay strong. I put my hope into the knitting and livestock farming training, which I will hopefully receive."

Determined to break free from her dependency on her husband, Shanta seeks

to empower herself. Her goals are clear: to build a toilet for her family, to ensure her children's education, and to fulfill their basic needs through her own efforts.

She expressed, "I imagine my child happy and safe at home. We can't be sure about hope, but I keep it close, like something that keeps me safe when times are tough."

Shanta Roka's story shows the incredible strength of a woman overcoming tough times. Her story is like many others, but it shines as an example of willpower and the effort to be independent. Through her story, we see the toughness in everyone and how hope and never giving up can change things.

The Echo of Empowerment: Kulmaya's Movement in Rural Nepal



Kulmaya Bishwokarma, a 22-year-old social mobilizer for ROYM Nepal from Khalte Tole in Nilkantha Municipality, Dhading, has become a beacon of hope and change within her community. Born and raised on the rugged terrain of the Dhading district alongside her six siblings, as well as her grandfather, father, and mother, her journey is one of resilience and

determination. From a young age, she was acutely aware of the social disparities and challenges faced by women in her locality.

Hailing from a family that valued education and community service, Kulmaya's upbringing was steeped in the ethos of empowerment and advocacy. Her parents, both involved in local agriculture, instilled in her the importance of self-sufficiency and the strength of collective action.

Kulmaya's role in the community is not just as a speaker but as a teacher, an educator of rights, and a catalyst for awareness in Nilkantha municipality, Dhading. Her efforts have led to the formation of women's groups in the five toles of Nilkantha, Dhading, including Ramche, Khalte, Pateni, Palpali, and Shyaldanda, where she has played a pivotal role in educating women about their rights and the benefits of agriculture.

Despite her strides, Kulmaya confronts the pervasive shadow of domestic violence, a specter that haunts the nights of Nilkantha. Men, lost to the clutches of alcohol, often unleash their fury upon their wives, leaving scars not just on the skin but the soul of the community.

Kulmaya said, "Domestic violence is a major issue here. Husbands drinking alcohol and quarreling with their wives at night is not uncommon. This isn't just in my community but also in neighboring ones within Nilkantha Municipality."

She further added, "There's a lack of responsibility among husbands; they don't support their families, which is why it's crucial to empower women and make them independent."

Yet, amidst these trials, Kulmaya remains optimistic. She envisions a future where women are independent, free from the shackles of financial reliance on men. She believes that the root of many domestic conflicts – money – can be eradicated through empowerment and education. Her dream is a society where women are aware of their rights and can lead dignified lives. She emphasized, "The impact I strive for is significant: women becoming independent, leading their lives without reliance on men, and becoming financially self-sufficient. This will reduce domestic conflicts over money and ensure women are aware of their rights."

Kulmaya also recognizes the importance of skill development tailored to the community's needs. Through training, awareness, and need identification, she aims to cultivate a ground for growth and self-sufficiency.

She said, "In our community, every woman is capable of crafting her destiny and learning new skills. It's about awakening the inherent strength within each woman to build a bright future."

The engagement of stakeholders is pivotal to her mission. Collaboration and

consensus among concerned parties are the cornerstones of sustainable change. While she cannot be omnipresent, Kulmaya's faith in effective communication and gradual progress make her determinant.

She articulated, “The strength of our mission lies in the support of every stakeholder.”

Her focus is on the Dalit community, where, with the support of ROYM Nepal, hope has been kindled. The expectations are high, and Kulmaya, along with her team, is committed to uplifting as many women as possible, regardless of their social standing. She remarked,, “Our Dalit sisters are coming back because of lack of awareness. With ROYM Nepal, we are optimistic; we can uplift them.”

The skill enhancement program in agriculture is vital. As per her, by promoting business-based farming of tomatoes, cauliflower, and potatoes and enhancing livestock milk production, the way for economic independence and prosperity can be nurtured.

Kulmaya Bishwokarma's story is about courage and determination. It is a narrative that deserves to be told to inspire and ignite the flames of change across communities far and wide. It serves as the indomitable spirit of the women of Nilkantha Municipality and the relentless pursuit of a better tomorrow.

A Happy Woman Indicates a Happy and Healthy Community - Anju Shakya



After receiving permission to launch the JIBIKA project in Netrawati Dabjong-5, ROYM-Nepal formed various groups, including farmer’s groups and women’s network groups. Among these, Barahi Krishak Samuha and Pariwartan Mahhila Sanjal were successfully established in Katunje, with Anju Shakya leading both groups as Chairperson. Today, she is admired as a prominent leader in her village.

Through these groups, Anju has had the opportunity to speak on numerous topics during meetings and campaigns organized by ROYM Nepal. She has also raised her voice against violence towards women. Anju feels that she has received a significant opportunity to advocate for women’s rights in her community by conducting various gender-based trainings and programs at the community level, in coordination with ROYM Nepal and the local government.

Santa Maya Tamang, a 41-year-old married woman living with her younger daughter in Netrawati Dabjong Rural Municipality, Ward No. 5, Reep Gaun, Dhading, is a shining example of resilience and hard work. Known

for her cheerful disposition and dedication, Santa Maya has been successfully managing local poultry farming alongside agriculture for the past few years.

Her journey began with a keen interest in poultry farming, starting with 36 chickens in a traditional coop. The income from her poultry farming has been instrumental in supporting her children's education and household needs. However, during home visits and direct interactions, it became evident that she faced challenges in properly managing her farm due to a lack of financial and technical resources. The chickens were kept in front of her house, posing risks of diseases and infections.

Determined to improve her farm's management, Santa Maya received financial and technical support from ROYM Nepal. This support significantly increased her income and transformed her into a successful local businesswoman. Today, she has 60 local poultry in her farm and has become a role model in her community, inspiring other women to pursue entrepreneurship.

"I have become a model of local poultry farming in my village. Thank you AEIN Luxembourg and ROYM Nepal for the support and changing my livelihood," said Santa Maya Tamang.

Born on October 5, 1991, Manisha Shrestha resides in Fyakse of Neelkantha Municipality, Ward No. 5, Dhading. Despite facing poverty and unemployment, she managed to complete her education up to class 10. In 2014 AD, she got married, but her living conditions did not improve. Soon after marriage, she gave birth to a baby girl, and the family struggled to make ends meet with her husband's income from driving a bus.

In 2023, ROYM Nepal initiated the JIBIKA Project, organizing programs to gather and regulate members of youth, farmer, and women's groups. Manisha became the chairperson of two groups: "Hatemalo Mahila Sanjal" and "Sahayogi Udhyaamil Krishak Samuha." ROYM Nepal provided technical knowledge and skillful practices, helping individuals like Manisha transform traditional farming systems into commercial enterprises.

"The JIBIKA Project has not only focused on economic empowerment but also on social empowerment for women," says Manisha Shrestha.

As a dedicated community member, Manisha took on the role of leader in her ward's women's network. She organized meetings, facilitated discussions on women's rights and health issues, and mobilized resources to support women in need. Through her efforts, women in the community gained confidence, learned new skills, and became empowered to advocate for themselves.

"Conducting community-level orientation programs on GBV and harmful traditional practices has been a significant part of my work," Manisha shared. "I also lead and advocate for a women-friendly budget in our ward."

Learning Through Orientation: The Story of Punam Devi Paswan



Punam Devi Paswan, a resident of Rautahat district, Brindaban Municipality, Ward No. 7, Sakuwa Dhamaura, is a member of Pratigya Mahila Samuha (Pratigya Women Group). Coming from a middle-class family with five members—her husband, two sons, and a daughter—Punam belongs to the marginalized Dalit community with a low income. The family engages in wage labor activities to meet their basic needs.

Punam’s life took a challenging turn when she was married off at a young age, leading to early pregnancy at 17. As a result, she continues to suffer from physical issues like illness and weakness. “It wasn’t easy being a mother at a young age, but I had to manage myself to care for the children. Even though I faced complications, I did the household chores during my prenatal and delivery periods,” she recalled.

Informed by the ward office about the formation of the women’s group, Punam became a member of Pratigya Women Group. Through her participation in

various orientations on gender violence, early marriage, and reproductive health, she gained valuable knowledge on these critical issues. “In our community, early marriage and gender violence are major issues. I was enthusiastic to participate in the meetings informed by the ward officer. ROYM Nepal simplified all the aims and objectives of the group formation and the project, which motivated me to engage in the group,” she explained.

Punam also actively participated in Menstruation Hygiene Day on 28th May 2024, supporting ROYM Nepal in organizing the program by communicating with adolescent girls and health workers for their participation. “I am glad to be a part of this program where all participants are influenced to analyze the need for necessary products, period education, and period-friendly infrastructure during menstruation,” she said.

As a member of the women’s group, Punam ensures female participation and monthly meetings. She disseminates information to the community about the importance of orientation and meetings. “I am grateful to ROYM Nepal for giving me an opportunity to be a member of the group and participate in the monthly orientation program. We conduct meetings on a monthly basis and discuss social issues. My aspiration is that no woman should face the same prenatal and postnatal problems I faced at a young age. I am hopeful that in the upcoming days, I will play a vital role in creating awareness

in society as an educator on women’s reproductive health,” she shared.

Punam’s story is a testament to the collective effort and dedication of ROYM Nepal and its partners. Her journey highlights the importance of education, empowerment, and community support in transforming lives and fostering sustainable development.

Anticipation on Mobile Repairing Training: The Story of Rinku Shah



Rinku Shah, a 16-year-old resident of Bangaha Municipality Ward No. 3, Mahottari district, Nepal, lives with her family of seven. Her father engages in wage labor activities to meet the family’s basic needs. Despite belonging to a marginalized community, Rinku’s parents prioritize education, sending her and her siblings to school. Currently, Rinku is studying in Grade XII at Shree Secondary School, Bangaha.

Growing up in a community surrounded by various social issues related to gender, and rights, Rinku has always been an active student, participating in extracurricular activities and community programs.

Encouraged by the ward office, she joined the youth group formation meeting and was elected as the secretary of Gadhimai Yuwa Samuha (Youth Group). She actively participates in orientation programs and plays a vital role in organizing monthly meetings for the youth group.

“I feel that the youth group is gender-responsive since females have equal participation and leadership positions,” said Rinku. “The orientation helped me understand gender violence and early marriage better. I learned about the causes and effects of these social issues in our society. Later, I want to be an educator to reflect these social issues among the community people by sharing the knowledge I gained from the orientation program. It was interesting to give pre-tests and post-tests in the program.”

A few months ago, a 65-day mobile repairing training was organized for the youth group, starting on 2nd June 2024. Rinku is participating in the training with keen interest and hopes to start her own business or work for a company after completing the program.

“At present, I am learning basic skills in electronics, hardware, software, and communication, and getting familiar with essential tools like soldering iron, multi-meter, screwdriver set, etc. I am very appreciative of every opportunity I received from ROYM Nepal. I also request ROYM Nepal to provide an advanced course to

raise my professionalism in mobile repairing,” Rinku shared.

Rinku’s story highlights the importance of education and skill development in empowering youth from marginalized communities. Her dedication and enthusiasm serve as an inspiration for others, demonstrating the transformative impact of community support and training programs.

Sarita Thapa - A Beacon of Transformation in Dhading



Sarita Thapa, a dedicated social mobilizer of ROYM Nepal from Dhulikhel, Kavre, has been a pillar of strength and inspiration for her community. From a young age, Sarita was interested in literature and humanities. She lived with relatives while attending school. After completing her +2 education, she began working as a social worker for various NGOs. As a social mobilizer, Sarita believes her role is to enhance awareness and mobilize the community towards positive change. She has been actively involved in educational initiatives, advocating for the importance of education, particularly for girls. This trust-building process led to significant changes

in the community. “At first, it was not easy. I was scared, overwhelmed, and nervous. But slowly, trust was gained through team support and community engagement,” Sarita reflected.

Sarita’s work extended to empowerment programs, where she conducted training sessions on various skills, enabling women to become financially independent and confident. Her dedication to creating a united and inclusive community was evident in her efforts to transcend caste and creed barriers. Overview:

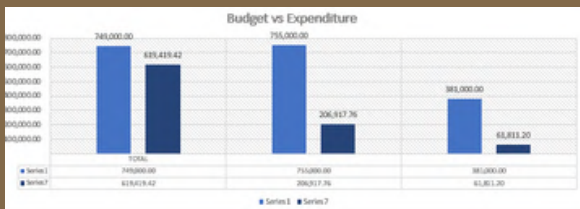

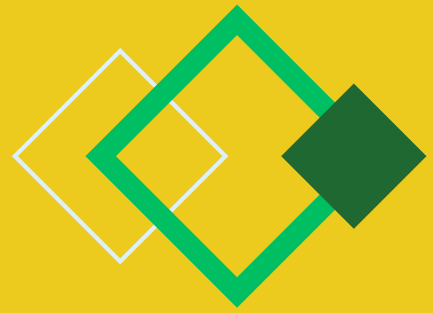
